

## Risky futures & other Business: The Risky Business Database Workshop

The Risky Business Project was created to locate and collect marine insurance prices from scholars' existing datasets, which otherwise may be lost, edited volumes and primary sources to integrate these in a new multinational open access database. This newly designed database (RBDB) now includes information from insurance markets in Genoa, Livorno, Venice, Dubrovnik, Amsterdam, Rotterdam, and covers a period from the early fifteenth until the late nineteenth century. The Project Team will meet with scholars and IT experts to discuss state-of-the-art DH tools, like HTR/OCR that may be integrated in the RBDB. In addition, we will be looking into crowd sourcing and marketing strategies to advance the project and as a tool to assist in preserving and maintaining RBDB's digital infrastructure in the future.
